





























































## YEAR 3,4














The Junior School Music program this year was offered to students in Reception to Year 4. Junior School Music follows the principles of the Orff Schulwerk methodology, using movement, speech, singing and playing to learn.

The Reception program this year focussed on learning the basic concepts of music, particularly beat and rhythm, and moving and dancing to music. Movement sessions focussed on developing coordination and vestibular control. We also engaged in guided listening activities, and reading and learning musical stories and rhymes.

The Year 1–4 programs focussed on learning the concepts of beat, rhythm, dynamics, tempo, pitch and timbre. Students developed skills playing instruments alone and in a group, and through a variety of activities including drumming, and making homemade instruments.


In Term 3 as part of our school's involvement in the Digital Technologies in Focus project, the Year 1 and 2 classes learned a simple dance and 'taught' the BeeBots the same dance through coding. The Year 3/4 class learned to use the coding program Scratch 2, and the Makey Makey devices, to code and create their own musical instruments using everyday materials. The students really enjoyed these lessons and were very engaged!





















In Term 2, the Year 7/8 class was excited to spend time at Hiltaba Nature Reserve for their class camp. When we arrived at Hiltaba on Monday, Nature Foundation SA's Kids on Country program staff members welcomed us with warm greetings, after which we were given room allocations. Once we had unpacked we drove to the granite boulder where we were amazed to see so many kangaroos, emus and wombats freely moving around. That night we went for a night walk up to the hill with torches and binoculars to observe the stars.

On Tuesday we were introduced to an engaging field activity called Geocaching. Students used GPS trackers to locate interesting sites on Hiltaba. Later that evening we had a cultural talk session where the local Traditional Owners of the Gawler Ranges talked to us about the significance of culture and tradition as we sat around the camp fire and cooked wombat and kangaroo tails.

Wednesday, everyone woke up early in the morning for a sunrise walk to observe the birds at Pretty Point. The scenery from the top of the hill was absolutely beautiful!







Our field activity on Thursday saw us travel to the Barbara Hardy Walking Trail with staff members from the Department of Environment and Water in the Arid Lands Region. On the trail we looked out for animal tracks. We able to observe animal footprints, faeces, feathers; traces left by kangaroos, emus, and wombats. That evening, we went on our last property tour. As we drove around we saw the dam in the homestead, the goat well and a wide variety of nature. We were all inspired by the awesomeness of the place.

It was great to see students engaging in various educational activities as they learned more about the land, the country and conservation. This camp allowed children to experience career pathway options that they may consider later in life. Pathways as Park Rangers, Working in Environment and Water department, Youth Program Co-ordinator and more. Students enjoyed connecting with the nature while having lots of fun and relaxing in the outback where they were actively involved in meaningful activities.

Students used a range of mediums over the year including mixed media, printing, painting, drawing and textiles.




















### Community Studies


