
How blessed I have been to be able to spend 2019 with the Year 6/7 Class!








YEAR 9/10



Junior School MUSIC



The Junior School Music program this year was offered to students in Reception to Year 5. Junior School Music follows the principles of the Orff Schulwerk methodology, using movement, speech, singing and playing to learn.

The Reception program focusses on learning the basic concepts of music, particularly beat and rhythm, and moving and dancing to music. Movement sessions focus on developing coordination and vestibular control. We also engage in guided listening activities, and reading and learning musical stories and rhymes.

The Year 1-5 program focusses on learning the concepts of beat, rhythm, dynamics, tempo, pitch and timbre. Students are also given opportunities to create their own music through improvisation, and begin learning to read music. They develop skills playing instruments alone and in a group through a variety of activities and games.

In Term 1 this year Mrs Sara Veerhuis taught the JS Music program, while I was on long service leave. The students engaged in lots of singing and held a performance at the end of term.



In Term 4 the Junior School Music classes were involved in an "Informance". The object of an Informance is to give parents and others an insight into what we do in our lessons, and to perform for them. The students all performed well, and there was plenty of positive feedback from the audience.

I look forward to more amazing Music from our students next year.


Technology has definitely become an essential part of our lives and our students have been focusing on both ICT and DT skills to ensure they are well prepared for our current and future needs.


